Oregon Community College Day at the Capitol Scheduled for Tuesday, April 5, 2005

Community College Day at the Capitol is our opportunity to show what we have to offer and how we make a difference in Oregon. The event takes place, for the most part, in the lobby just south of the rotunda. We will have tables set with interactive displays that showcase some of the many programs offered by community colleges. Our students are really the best at making the point about the value of community college training and education. We want to have students at the event throughout the day.

The theme for 2005 is "Powerful Solutions for Oregon's Economic Recovery." Planned displays and events for the day include: LBCC Radiological Technology display featuring Annie mannequin; Mount Hood Sim-Man mannequin; Central Oregon Message program massage chair; Chemeketa and Lane Culinary Arts display; Portland Veterinary Technology display; Clatsop Fire Science for marine display; Chemeketa Fine Arts display; Clackamas Business Services and Workforce Training for CAD display; and Rogue Advanced Technology mini robots display.

Every college is urged to bring key staff and especially students to meet with legislators and make a major presence in the Capitol building that day.

LBCC Awarded Federal TRIO Grant

LBCC has been awarded a federal TRIO grant that will help first-generation, low income and disabled students attend LBCC. This grant will give LBCC roughly \$200,000 per year for the next four years, with the possibility of a fifth year.

Board of Education Highlights

Board member resigns-LBCC Board of Education member Marshall Johnson resigned from the board effective April 1. Johnson has served on the board for eight years, representing Albany zone 2-3A. He is leaving the Albany area for a sales position at a radio station in The Dalles.

The board is seeking candidates to fill the vacancy on an interim basis through June 2005. Candidates must be a registered voter residing in Albany zone 2-3A. Eligible candidates are asked to submit a letter of intent and resume to the President's Office by April 8. The board will select the interim member at their April 20 meeting. Voters will select someone to fill the four-year term in the May election.

Budget Committee Appointment-Elaine McLain, President and CEO of Central Willamette Credit Union, was appointed to serve on the budget committee. Richard Mueller was elected chair of the budget committee. Other budget committee members are: Erland Erickson, Alice True, Mark McNabb, Scott Simpson, Patrick Malone, and Barbara Sleezer.

Staff News-President Cavin introduced John McArdle, recently hired development director for the LBCC Foundation. Dawn McNannay was introduced as the new Lebanon Center and Sweet Home Center director (effective July). Ann Marie Etheridge is the new incoming faculty president for the board. Penny York introduced three "Project Welcome Home" soldiers and spoke about efforts to coordinate LBCC services for several hundred soldiers returning to the local area from Iraq.

New Program Approved for submission to Dept of Ed-James Bell and Ann Malosh submitted an Incident Command System Certificate (24 credits) for board approval. The certificate is designed for organizations needing to develop a comprehensive plan to respond to biological, chemical or nuclear threats. Healthcare administrators, healthcare practitioners, government officials and public safety officials will sponsor employees to participate in this program. The first cohort will likely be a group from Samaritan Health Services.

Participants will learn to handle a wide range of emergency situations in a healthcare setting, develop plans to handle emergency situations and learn to work effectively in stressful conditions while providing leadership. Courses will be a blend of on-line Internet-based coursework with standard in-person lecture/lab meetings. This will

McArdle New Development Director of College Advancement/Foundation

John McArdle is the new Development Director of College Advancement and Foundation office. John has 24 years experience in the non-profit and public sectors, spending the last 15 years as Director of Development at Western Oregon University. He holds a BS in Community Service Public Administration and a BS in Recreation and Park Management, both from University of Oregon.

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be a fee-based program with each course costing \$250. The proposal now goes to the Department of Education for approval.

Other action items-The 2005-06 academic calendar was approved. College closure days-July 1, August 5, September 2, and December 27, 28, 29 and 30. Inservice closures September 13 and April 13. Jim Huckestein explained the outcome of the PERS liability arising from the LBCC relationship with the now defunct OATC (Oregon Advanced Technology Consortium). The board approved the \$9,071 payment of the LBCC share of this liability.

Special Presentation-Ann Malosh and Gary Price discussed the economic health of the Albany, Millersburg, and Tangent areas based on results of a recent survey by the Albany-Millersburg Economic Development Corp., the Albany Chamber, City of Albany and City of Millersburg. Survey results were based on responses from 33 large manufacturing companies. The three factors with the greatest impact to the health of these companies are market conditions, labor costs and domestic competition. Most competition comes from the national level, then international, state-wide and local. LBCC was ranked high on several factors impacting economic development, recruiting business to the area, retention of existing businesses and providing workforce training. Fifty percent of those surveyed indicated they have difficulty filling job openings.

Industries adding the most jobs are manufacturing, wood products, primary metals, retail trade and leisure and hospitality.

Awards-OCOA awarded Marshall Johnson for eight years of service on a community college board and to Joseph Novak for 24 years of service.

The next Board meeting will be held Wednesday, April 20, at 7:30 p.m. in the Albany Boardrooms.
